## Quantum leaps

One of the benefits of changing jobs is the ability to take a deep breath, take the long view and gain a perspective on where one is. For me, this life-changing event had the serendipitous pleasure of coinciding with my reading of a book, Leadership and the New Science, by Margaret Wheatley.<sup>1</sup> I was drawn to the book via a review in *Library Journal* and also by way of the questions I've been asking of myself lately. And although I'd like to recommend that everyone change jobs if they so desire and have the opportunity, perhaps SUNY libraries would be better off if you just read the book.

Wheatley artfully writes of the advances of science in terms of this century's discoveries in quantum physics and how those discoveries have impacted her thinking in terms of organizational behavior and leadership. She explains that the quantum world is a world that values chaos as well as order, (this does speak to today's librarian, does it not?) where even chaos has boundaries and order naturally moves toward entropy. The important point, in both quantum theory and Leadership is the value of relationship and the value of process. I cannot emphasize that enough: *the value of relationship* and *the value of process*.

It's at this point that, even in the midst of change, I feel a sense of calm and gratitude for relationships that have been but also for the promise and catalytic anticipation for relationships of the future. Thanks to those who engage me in their process, through questions, email, lunch, and laughter; enabling me to more quickly discern a pattern and direction to my personal trajectory. Your being has made an impact.

From Wheatley: "As leaders, we play a crucial role in selecting the melody, setting the tempo, establishing the key, and inviting the players. But that is all we can do. The music comes from something we cannot direct, from a unified whole among the players—a relational holism that transcends separateness. In the end, when it works, we sit back, amazed and grateful." (p. 44)

Thanks to all who so generously agreed to appear on this year's ballot and to all those who choose to be active in SUNYLA. In reference to Wheatley's musical metaphor above, and using the words of Irving Berlin: *let's face the music and dance*.<sup>2</sup>

Enjoy the conference.

## Looking Back and Looking Forward Conference Theme Therapy

In pondering our conference theme, and by way of some recent accidental research, I find that our conference theme is not only educational and enlightening, but may also be, well... therapeutic. I read an article recently and it has me thinking. As I look back and look forward, I am slightly saddened (but mostly relieved) to finally realize that the future of our profession does not rest entirely on our individual shoulders.

The other day as I left for lunch, I reached over to grab a journal for lunchtime reading. It just happened to be on the top of my pile of professional literature that I never seem to get through. The journal was the EDUCAUSE Review for Jan/Feb 2000, and a paper clip marked an article that my director had noted and passed on to me. Just coincidentally, the article was titled "From Automation to Transformation: Forty Years of Libraries and Information Technology in Higher Education," and was written by our conference keynote speaker, Clifford Lynch, Executive Director of the Coalition for Networked Information. The article contains a very thorough and very succinct review of how technology has changed the way librarians and libraries work over the past four decades. It also provides a wonderful context for how we may think about past innovations, as well as prepare (and brace) ourselves for the future transformation in libraries.

I must admit, there have been times when I have been found basking in the glow of the thought that I was one of a new generation of unabashed, techno-information professionals sometimes referred to as librarians. I admit that I have enjoyed the feeling that I was one of the few and the proud librarians born on the cusp of the information revolution. Even more, I have felt the awesome responsibility and honor associated with our part in transforming libraries and information access for a new millennium. But, thanks to Mr. Lynch, I fear I may have been flattering myself just a bit. I also may have been taking myself a little too seriously. His article has helped me gain some needed perspective, and for that I am very glad. In fact, I am a bit relieved. I don't know about you folks, but I was getting worried. These are heavy burdens and expectations that we face.



Like many of us, I was one who entered the profession primarily to care for books, journals, and, perhaps, some non-print materials. I remember being very curious and excited as to how technology would impact our many roles, but blind to the transformation that had already occurred. I was surely aware of the many innovations that came before, but I was in need of a dose of useful perspective.

In library school, I played with a Macintosh Classic and made wonderful banners for library signage. In Cataloging class, we spent a good week, or maybe even two, analyzing the format of that curious entity called the MARC

record. In Introduction to Computers class, I remember playing the part of "Mr. Computer Processor," literally running back and forth around the classroom receiving and delivering messages to and from classmates who played the roles of "Mr. Input Device" and "Mrs. Operating System." And so, when I left school, I felt truly armed, and knowing, and ready to implement a vision. But, as you can see, I lacked perspective.

Whether or not it was his intent, Mr. Lynch has burst my prideful bubble by providing me with a context to better appreciate the past. This article is a terrific primer for technology professionals who are unlikely to be familiar with the rich history of innovations that are the foundation of modern library service. However, the article has also helped to provide this librarian with a useful historical perspective of 40 years of "modernization," "innovation," and "transformation" in our field. The moral of the story for me is a greater recognition and appreciation of the developments that have come before. It is helpful to understand and appreciate that our systems were born out of the need to "modernize" inefficient practices, that "innovations" grew out of imagination, and that our present challenges are a result of the "transformation" that has necessarily and wonderfully occurred. Modernization, innovation, and transformation have been around long before me, as has the technology that has profoundly changed the work we do. My bubble has burst, but I think I can relax now.

**University at Albany** Campaign for the Libraries Tops its \$3 Million Goal: Thanks to the generosity of more than 3,000 donors and to a \$500,000 challenge grant from The Kresge Foundation, the University at Albany, SUNY, has raised \$3.8 million in private funds to help equip its libraries as state-of-the-art interchanges on the information superhighway. Launched in April of 1998, the Campaign for the Libraries sought to raise \$3 million by the end of 1999 and thereby earn a \$500,000 Kresge Foundation challenge grant. At the final stroke of 1999, donors had contributed \$3,302,291. The Kresge grant raised the final total to \$3,802,291. The library project marked an important private-public partnership for the University. New York State provided \$26.6 million to construct and equip a new library housing science collections, the M.E. Grenander Department of Special Collections and Archives, a preservation and digitization laboratory, and the University's Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning. The Campaign for the Libraries then sought \$3.5 million in private support to fully update and coordinate the new building with the University at Albany's other two libraries, the University Library on the uptown campus and the Thomas E. Dewey Graduate Library for Public Affairs and Policy on the downtown campus.

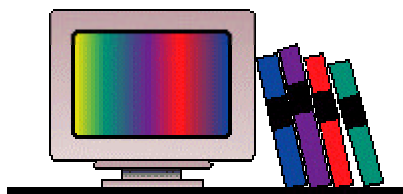

New, simpler off-campus access to electronic databases for students, faculty, and other members of the SUNY New Paltz community, is now possible, via EZProxy. Previously, patrons set up a special account and had to use the college as their Internet Provider. Beginning with the Spring 2000 Semester, users confirm their affiliation with the college, using I.D. and password.

The completion of compact shelving for bound periodicals has led to a major recarpeting project for the stacks area of the library. The library benefits in two ways, gaining much needed space, as well as increased comfort and aesthetic appeal for patrons.

During its second semester of use, ERes, electronic reserves, has seen a dramatic increase in use by New Paltz faculty and students. Good news and bad news... access from anywhere, but other issues? The lines form at the printer instead of the copy machine. Still, you can't go home again, and ERes is probably here to stay.
